*Scriptorium* by Naomi Kasumi includes tapestry panels made from recycled, then dried tea bags, inscribed with Japanese calligraphy and scriptures, and hand stitched with thread. Each tiny panel includes found objects from nature, which are covered in beeswax to create a floating sculpture.
